President's Message—Betty Fessler

First and foremost, I would like to thank everyone for their cooperation in making the January meeting successful. I received a fair number of responses to the Committee Survey sheets and have passed those on to the current committee chairs. They should be reaching out to those who have responded this month. Second, I would like to say that we have, unfortunately, had some items disappear at the Senior Center during the last 2-3 months, kitchen supplies and library books, so please do not leave anything valuable behind. I had hoped to obtain a larger, better secured area for our storage needs, but they have indicated that they do not have the space.

Next, I want to talk a little bit about the history of "Valentine's Day". Did you know that roughly 141 million Valentine's Day cards are exchanged annually in the U.S., and this excludes the packaged children's valentines for classroom exchanges? This is second only to Christmas card sending. Research shows that over 50% of those cards are purchased within 6 days of the holiday. It is commonly thought that St. Valentine who inspired the holiday may have been two different men. Officially recognized by the Roman Catholic Church, St. Valentine is known to be a real person who died around A.D. 270, but came into question as early as A.D. 496 by Pope Gelasius I. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome when then Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers and outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When caught he was ordered put to death. Another legend talks of an imprisoned Valentine who fell in love. Could they be the same? Who knows? By the Middle Ages, Valentine was one of the most popular saints in England and France. The St. Valentine we celebrate is known officially as St. Valentine of Rome in order to differentiate him from the other dozen or so Valentines on the list. You could choose to celebrate a Valentine multiple times each year such as November 3 for St. Valentine of Viterbo, or January 7 for St. Valentine of Raetia. Women might choose July 25 for the only female saint, St. Valentine (Valentina), a virgin martyred in Palestine in A.D. 308. The Eastern Orthodox Church officially celebrates St. Valentine twice each year, once as an elder of the church on July 6, and once as a martyr on July 30th.

The original Valentine's Day may have been celebrated at the ides of February, or February 15, in an attempt to Christianize the pagan celebration of Lupercalia. It was a fertility festival which survived the initial rise of Christianity but was outlawed as un-Christian by Pope Gelasius I, who declared February 14th St. Valentine's Day at the end of the 5th Century.

The written Valentine didn't appear until after 1400. Chaucer may have invented the written Valentine's Day as we know it when he wrote a poem in 1375 called "Parliament of Foules". Valentine's greetings were popular as far back as the Middle Ages, but were most likely verbal greetings and maybe a flower, such as knights giving a rose to their fair maidens and singing songs from afar. Candy was not associated with Valentines as sugar was still a precious commodity in Europe. Americans began exchanging hand-made valentines in the early 1700's and in the 1840s, Esther A. Howland, known as the Mother of the Valentine, began selling the first mass-produced valentines in America. Richard Cadbury is thought to be the first candy maker to produce a heart-shaped box, billed as having a dual purpose. One could eat the candy, then use the box to store mementos, from locks of hair to love letters, and there you go....

Programs—Kerry Hansing

One suggestion for new attendees would be to let them know in advance that even though the class starts at 10:00 am it is best to arrive as much as an hour earlier to set up."

February 13, 2016

Sharon Templeton will present and teach in **February**. She calls herself "**The Chaotic Quilter,**" and her lecture is titled "Chaos, while her workshop is "Chaotic Hearts." Sharon will share her quilts, time tested tips, favorite tools, and methods for basic block making. Here is an example of her work.



Chaotic Hearts Workshop

"Chaotic Hearts" -Just in time for Valentines Day. You will need a yard of background fabric and your sewing tools.

Are you new to quilting and need to learn the terms and techniques to becoming a skilled quilter? Sharon is providing a three ring binder with the pattern and detailed instructions as well as her expertise in class. Do you know how to make a mitered corner border? She will show you tips on mitered corner borders. They make any quilt look so professional (I need that).

You may decide to make it monochromatic and use only one color way for your hearts with your background fabric (eg. all reds or blues). Sharon will help you select the colors that work well together if you are making scrappy hearts. You have several options: use a Jelly Roll, Balipop, or your own set of 2 1/2" strips -OR- even easier purchase a kit from Sharon.

SUPPLY LIST: Chaotic Hearts!!

This is such a fun project to use some of your bits and pieces you've been saving. Now is a quick and cute way to use some, which is why you were keeping them, right? I usually make this quilt with a theme in mind, babies, kids, floral. I've used white, cream and black as a background. My one constant is my background, where I use the same fabric for all the blocks and the setting triangles.

You can choose to make these blocks whatever size you want. For the purposes of the class we are going to make 4 1/2" unfinished blocks.

The size I make most frequently has 59 blocks in it. Each block needs your "novelty" fabric and a background piece. I like to speed piece so my background (which I use the same background for the quilt) I cut in strips. So for this project you will need

Novelty or Theme Fabric 59 - 7" x 2 1/2" strips
Cut a 2 1/2" square off of each strip, and keep with the now 4 1/2" x 2 1/2" remaining piece.

Background Fabric 2 1/2" by width of fabric. You need 4 strips to make the 59 blocks.

For the setting triangles, you will need 5 - 7" squares for the sides.

For the corners you need 2 - 3 3/4" squares.

For borders, bring the fabric you would like to use, and I'll have a worksheet for you to use to make the easy mitered borders. I'll also have a worksheet to show how to make the two color bindings.

Basic Sewing Supplies, machine, thread, snipping scissors, pins if you like to use them. Rotary cutter with fresh blade. Ruler with 45 degree angle on it.

Design wall space is very helpful for laying the blocks out.

LLQG workshops really are geared towards all skill levels and are a lot of fun. Come for the sewing and the camaraderie and you just might learn something new as well. Note that if the classes don't fill with Guild members, they will be open to non-members for a \$10 increase in fee.

Linda Morrison, speaking as Chairman of the Falling Leaves Quilt Show for 2016, clarified the budget issues, and clarified that issues unrelated to the budget can be handled at the show committee meetings.

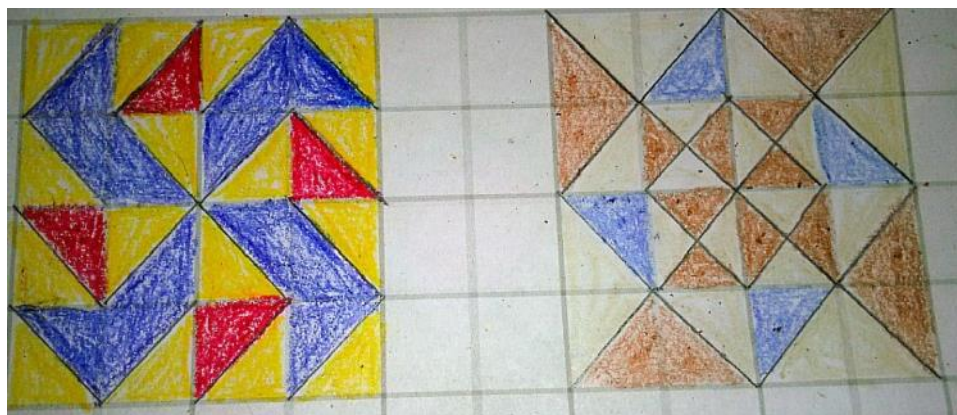

Hi everyone and happy New Year. The first class for Skills Day will be the 19th of March. We will be learning basic quilt piecing. Some of the things we will go over are Half Square Triangles, Quarter Square Triangles, and Flying Geese. We will be working on two blocks that will cover these unites. The class will be at the Scotts Valley Women's Club and start at 10 am. Below are the two blocks so you can choose your fabric.

The supplies you will need:

- Sewing Machine
- Rotary Cutter and Mat
- Thread
- Fabric at least 3 fat quarters for each block we will be making 2.
- Spray Starch.
- Rulers: square up (at least 6 inch) and a 6 inch by 24.
- Marking tool. I use friXion on pens
